## A Solving the Search-Based Model

This Appendix provides detailed derivations of the equilibrium conditions presented in the main text.

## A. 1 The Households' Problem

## A. 2 Firms in the Centralized Market

The setup of the centralized market resembles that of a New Keynesian DSGE model. Production is carried out by two types of firms in the CM: final good producers combine differentiated intermediate goods. Intermediate goods producing firms hire labor and capital services from the households to produce the inputs for the final good producers. To introduce nominal rigidity we follow Calvo (1983) by assuming that only a constant fraction of the intermediate goods producers is able to re-optimize prices.

Final Good Producers solve the problem

## A. 3 Aggregate Resource Constraint and National Accounting

To take the model to the data we will now construct a GDP deflator and a measure of real output that is consistent with this GDP deflator. Following NIPA conventions, we use a Fisher price index. However,
to simplify the analysis we replace time-varying nominal shares by steady state shares. The DM share of nominal output in the steady state is

Figure A-1: The top panel depicts the welfare gain of reducing the target inflation rate below $2.5 \%$. In the bottom panel we report the posterior expected probability that the regret of choosing a particular target inflation rate is more than $0.01 \%$. For the estimated value of $\nu$ welfare is maximized at $0 \%$ inflation, which is the prediction of a cashless DSGE model. If $\nu$ is choosen to match the long-run interest rate elasticity, the optimal target inflation rate is around $-1 \%$.
